

# Roundup of Emporium of Dangerous Ideas 2014

## The Emporium of Dangerous Ideas



College Development Network (CDN) in partnership with a number of key organisations ran an extremely successful Emporium of Dangerous Ideas 2014 from 06 - 19 June, with

**twenty five events**  
and over **1,500 delegates**

in attendance. The Emporium culminated with a finale at the breathtaking location of Helix Park, Falkirk, with dangerous conversations taking place inside the Kelpie.

The theme of the two-week Emporium was Exploring Design for Learning and considered 'where does learning take place and how we can use public spaces creatively.' This theme was certainly explored during the period with a successful launch on Friday 06 June at the Riverside Museum in Glasgow. Further events took place in various locations across Scotland including: an outdoor classroom 3-day experience in Moffat, exploring creativity and enterprise in education at the St Mungo Museum of Religious Life and Art, Glasgow, dangerous conversations on a fishing boat in Arbroath, on an open topped double-decker bus outside Edinburgh College and finally finishing on Thursday 19 June at the Helix Park inside the 'head-up' Kelpie – a unique experience as it is currently not open for public tours.

The Emporium is an opportunity to capture people's ideas, take people out of their comfort zone and plan and create the educational experiences that could be delivered across the education system in Scotland. It is an opportunity for conversations to share and develop ideas, take risks, change perspectives, make connections with others and take forward into practice ideas that will shape the future of education.



## Seafood in Colleges – Exciting new project for Colleges



As part of the Scottish Seafood Partnership Action Plan, Seafood Scotland has partnered with College Development Network (CDN), to promote the seafood industry and all its facets to young people who are continuing with their further and higher education in Scotland's colleges.

The Seafood in Colleges project aims to showcase some of the exciting and interesting careers available in the seafood sector and its supply chain, and the skills required.

Students studying in areas such as science, business, catering, hospitality, engineering or food technology may not be aware of what opportunities there are in this important area – the seafood industry and its supply chain is second only to whisky in its value to the Scottish economy and is a global success story.

Colleges in Scotland have a rich tradition in training some of the UK's brightest and most talented young chefs with many going on to careers worldwide. By promoting alternative sustainable fish and shellfish species, health benefits associated with a seafood diet and options for using their skills in the production/processing side of the supply chain, our partnership can help ensure a future workforce is equipped to meet the challenges the industry faces.

The Action Plan includes objectives relating to a skilled workforce, promoting traditional skills and modern advanced technologies, local sourcing and developing leaders for the industry. The Seafood in Colleges project is an opportunity for all colleges to be involved in this initiative.

### Details of the pilot project

The project pilot, running from August to the end of December 2014, will include three interactive events taking place in regional colleges. A number of colleges have nominated their campuses to host a pilot event, two of which will be aimed at the student body and one at college staff as a CPD event. CDN will publish on our website dates

and details of the host colleges for the Seafood in Colleges Pilot Events.

Following the events CDN will work with the host colleges to evaluate them; a full evaluation report will be submitted by Seafood Scotland and CDN to the Scottish Seafood Partnership in a bid to make the Seafood in Colleges events a permanent feature in the curriculum.

### The Events

- The audience for the student events will be full or part-time students from Science, Hospitality, Tourism, Professional Cookery, Food Manufacturing, Food Science, Lab Skills and those being assessed by the colleges' Work Based Learning teams and studying on day-release from relevant workplaces.
- The events are designed to bring students' thinking about fish and seafood bang up to date. The events will include cookery and skills' demonstrations, tastings and presentations on sustainability, looking at the health of our seas, sustainable species of fish, new species, seasonal species, uses for seaweed and other aquaculture produce, the importance of the industry and its wellbeing for the Scottish economy, health and nutrition benefits of seafood. CDN will work with the host college to agree a programme that suits their students and the environment.
- The CPD Workshop aimed at Scotland's colleges staff will include the topics outlined above and explore how teaching staff can use the seafood industry as context for multi-disciplinary learning across the curriculum.
- In addition CDN will invite local producers to speak at these events about different careers in the sector and explain the skills, knowledge and education needed if young people are to enter the industry above base-level jobs.
- CDN will promote new qualifications available for the food and drink sector – the National Progression Award in Food Manufacturing at SCQF Level 5 and The National 5 Skills for Work in Food Manufacturing. These are modern, relevant qualifications covering topics such as sustainability, consumers, marketing, science fundamentals and food safety.

## NPA in Food Manufacturing – A Tasty New Qualification

A tasty new qualification in food manufacturing – which contains the perfect ingredients for individuals to progress their careers – has been launched.

The National Progression Award (NPA) in Food Manufacturing (SCQF level 6) is a hands-on course, reflecting the practical nature of the sector. Students will gain knowledge and experience in the various basic essential areas of the industry to enable them to move into more specialised roles.

College Development Network (CDN) in partnership with SQA is actively developing resources to support each of the Units within the course, providing tutor support packs, writing e-assessments and signposting relevant materials in Re:Source – the college repository.

This qualification is aimed at young adults, adult returners and those already employed in the food and drink industry. It allows candidates to develop specific knowledge and skills required for employment, specialised roles or progressing to further study in the sector. Units include food science, food manufacturing, commercial and social drivers and sustainability. The qualification can be delivered in schools and colleges and alongside modern apprenticeships supported by Skills Development Scotland. Several leading industry employers were involved in the validation of the qualification in the design stages, ensuring its relevance to today's employers.

## Learning through Gaming

The use of technology-mediated gaming environments is becoming increasingly embedded in learning experiences across educational contexts. Many games are inherently engaging, provide novel and immersive learning environments with varying degrees of complexity and clearly reward success. Technology-mediated games may, in some contexts, offer a more enhanced learning experience than other traditional pedagogical approaches.

An example of this was the recent 'Minecraft Challenge', part of the Emporium of Dangerous Ideas 2014, which concluded at the end of May.

The Challenge was designed to use Minecraft as a learning environment and to encourage development of collaborative skills in a range of learner groups including primary and secondary schools and colleges. Teams from Scotland, England, Norway, and Australia participated - over 100 students!

As the Challenge was prior to the commencement of the Commonwealth Games 2014 in Glasgow, the theme was 'Reflecting upon the preparations for the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow and on the construction of the various sporting sites, design and build an "Eco-Friendly Living and Sporting Environment".'



Teams consisted of between four and six students and, as well as building an environment within Minecraft, they were asked to produce evidence of:

- discussion of what an ideal eco-friendly sporting, recreational and living environment would look like
- planning and design of the environment
- reasoning for design decisions
- reflection upon personal and group learning and skills development throughout the project

Teams were encouraged to utilise online/social media tools to support discussion, collaboration and sharing. Evidence of use of social media was included within the criteria for judging.

From the commencement of the Challenge on 24 March 2014, participants demonstrated a range of creative skills and collaborative activity including sharing of knowledge and skills, inter-team support and peer learning.

The Challenge concluded at the end of May 2014 with winners from Scotland, Norway and Australia.

## Offering a Creative Education to learners in Scotland

Creativity across the curriculum will continue to be a focus for College Development Network (CDN) in academic session 2014-15. Educationalist Sir Ken Robinson argues that creativity is as important as literacy and should be given the same status. Paul Collard, Chief Executive at Creativity Culture & Education (CCE), believes that a creative education reduces the dominance of transmission in education so that students can achieve good academic results as well as the opportunity to develop resilience, discipline and agency.

There is an emerging consensus, especially from developmental psychologists such as Sternberg and Csikszentmihalyi, that creativity is innate in all of us and learnable in different ways. Siegel identifies 'creative exploration' as one of the four qualities set up by neurological and physiological changes during adolescence.

CDN has acknowledged the implications of this research on how our learners are taught, assessed and organised. In early September we hosted two conversations on 'Assessing Creativity' on a barge on the Union Canal where we discussed how we could measure the progression of creativity skills in ourselves and in our learners.



Both events were extremely well attended; delegates found it 'a useful and enjoyable morning'.

Following the same genre CDN is delighted to welcome Paul Collard on board the Lochrin Belle barge on Thursday 25 September to work on:

- recognising the creative skills and behaviours of educators and learners
- planning and evaluating creative learning activities
- measuring the success of creative learning activities

## Emerging Leaders

The programme is designed for those who are relatively new to leadership roles (from head of section to senior management team) with the optimism and creative capacity to develop the college sector of the future. This six month programme will stretch, challenge and support leaders for the future. Testimonials from previous participants highlight the challenging and creative aspects of this programme.

*'At a time when the FE sector is experiencing an incredibly challenging/difficult time, this course has personally come at just the right time for me. The two days in Glasgow were great ... from the initial "days of danger" (which I thought was brilliant) to the speakers (who were interesting, thought provoking and promoted creativity).'*

## Outcomes

Throughout the programme participants will engage in a range of participative, collaborative and thought-provoking activities aimed at stimulating creative approaches to leadership. By the end of the programme participants will:

- have an understanding of the need to respond creatively to the complexities and opportunities presented across education sectors
- be clear about the transformational role of leadership in college education and across the public sector
- be able to understand and demonstrate creative, enterprising, and intrapreneurial approaches to leadership

- have investigated other organisations and enterprises through visiting speakers, case studies and targeted visits
- have developed insights and ideas from the programme to develop an action plan for college development
- have pitched and presented ideas to senior leaders in education and other key stakeholders
- put ideas into practice and reflected on outcomes and process.

'The speakers have been very inspirational. I really enjoyed the session on coaching too. Overall I have benefited greatly from the opportunity to be reflective and to think about the type of leader I want to be. I am thoroughly enjoying being with such a lovely, supportive and funny group of people.'

'I found the residential session to be one of the best I have been on, it was inspiring and I feel it had maximum impact as the "out and about session" was followed by reflection – regular classroom reflection has felt quite different. This was quite powerful and the session left me with lots of thought. The mix of experience in the group allowed for questions and it was good to check things out. I liked the balance of networking and really looking at leadership within myself.'

'I was attracted to the fresh approach to training managers. It was not focused on processes and "management techniques" lifted from self-help books, which I thought was great. The emphasis on creativity as an outlet and driver of development was excellent. Realistically, I was also attracted to a CPD opportunity which would stand me in good stead for new opportunities in a time of change in the college sector.'



## Changes at College Development Network

You may have heard that from Friday 01 August 2014, College Development Network (CDN) is again a completely separate company from Colleges Scotland. A new Board is in place, led by Paul Houlden, which consists of eight members; four from the education sector, the CEO, and three externals all of whom have a strong interest in education.



CDN plans to work in close partnership with each of the colleges to both support them following regionalisation and to provide support and resources to enable them to deliver high quality, efficient learning to current and future learners. To this end, CDN is currently looking at how it can best organise itself to listen to the needs of the colleges and to ensure that those needs are met efficiently and cost-effectively. It will also seek to strengthen relationships with the business world to increase the opportunities for employment for Scotland's young people.

CDN would like to thank the previous Board, led by Principal, Alan Sherry for their support and guidance during the period of organisational restructuring.

## Curriculum, Curriculum, Curriculum!

The Commission for Developing Scotland's Young Workforce (the Wood Report), contains several messages for education providers. The report has resulted in all key organisations focusing on how they will support the recommendations 2014-2020. College Development Network (CDN) has worked to ensure that our Business and Operational plans align to the recommendations. Key messages highlighted in the report are:

- the need for a college curriculum fully focused on employability and responding to industry's skills needs at the regional and national levels
- clearer vocational pathways, starting in the senior phase, which lead to industry recognised qualifications



- identifying curriculum resources published under an open licence through Re:source, your college repository
- employability for students with a range of support needs
- Essential Skills Network
- engaging with employers in the key economic sector areas for delivery at CDN events, conferences and webinars.


