


Enabling Student Carers



At a launch event on Wednesday 07 May at Hampden Park, new resources from College Development Network (CDN) – *Enabling Student Carers* were showcased. A number of students carers shared their experiences with Public Health Minister Michael Matheson, representatives from colleges and carer organisations across Scotland.

The new resources are based around video testimonies of six student carers and have been developed into a participative three-hour training seminar aimed at staff across colleges.



The resource also provides colleges with an action planning tool to improve the experience of student carers.

Louise Morgan from the Carers Trust said: 'The real strength of these resources is that they're raising awareness about the extra pressure on student carers.'

Student carers face all the normal pressures of studying, but go home to another 'job', whether it's providing physical or emotional care. Making college staff even more aware of the mental, emotional or physical impact that caring situations have on students is essential to ensure learning is enjoyable and sustainable for students.'

- HND Advertising and Public Relations internship experiences – City of Glasgow College


A popular addition to the day was the Nail Bar set up by students from Glasgow Kelvin College.

Food and Drink Manufacturing Workstream



Since October, College Development Network (CDN) has been working on several priorities to promote college curriculum alignment with the Food and Drink Manufacturing Sector here in Scotland.

A launch event was held late March to promote the new Food and Drink manufacturing qualifications at SCQF levels 5 and 6. This looked more closely at the industry's needs for skilled staff and discussed what help and support colleges require to be able to deliver the Skills for Work in Food Manufacturing (Level 5) and National Progression

Award in Food Manufacturing (Level 6). This can be delivered either in partnership with their regional schools or as stand-alone qualifications.

A steering group was formed with representation from college lecturers, SQA, Scottish Food and Drink Federation (SFDF) and CDN Managers. Work has commenced on writing the unit assessments and gathering teaching support resources ready for delivery to coincide with '2015, Scotland's Year of Food & Drink'.

Further events are planned including CPD to help explore the interesting and complex Field to Table supply chain that makes up Food and Drink.

In the Hospitality, Travel and Tourism News section on CDN's website you will begin to see more articles about the Food and Drink manufacturing sector with signposting to free training, industry news and events. These resources can be used as context for delivery of a range of subjects including STEM, Economics, business and supply chain knowledge in Hospitality. Many of the articles, videos and case studies also give insights into career opportunities for students. Our open resources' portal on the website, Re:Source, will have a dedicated section for food and drink manufacturing.

The steering group visited College of Agriculture, Food and Rural Enterprise (CAFRE) in Northern Ireland in early May and were impressed by the range of courses offered for students who aspire to enter the food manufacturing sector across Ireland and in some cases further afield. The group is currently looking into articulation or joint delivery options to offer a seamless and clear route of study for young people, adult returners and those in work wishing to advance their careers.

CDN's leaflet 'Food and Drink Manufacturing – Opportunities for Colleges' gives an overview of the sector, some key facts, statistics and the economic drivers that represent opportunities for colleges to get involved.

Identifying and Assessing Creativity Skills Across the Curriculum

Creativity is very clearly at the heart of the philosophy of Curriculum for Excellence and is fundamental to the definition of what it means to be a 'successful learner' in the Scottish education system. Creativity skills are exercised in a wide variety of contexts across the curriculum. There is however a job to be done in ensuring that creativity skills are recognised and identified, in order that they can be assessed and their impact on achievement demonstrated.

College Development Network (CDN) and Education Scotland are working in partnership with the Creative Learning Networks and TagAssessment to run a pilot to demonstrate how the development of creativity skills can be tracked and assessed across a wide range of activities. In the pilot we are exploring the potential of using LiveAssess and Adaptive Comparative Judgement software to do this.

LiveAssess is a tool used to capture and assess soft skills including creativity and collaboration. The software can be used to measure the learning process as well as the end product. More information about LiveAssess can be found at www.tagdev.co.uk/liveassess

More Colleges are Taking Students on a Big Adventure



College Development Network (CDN) is working in partnership with the Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) scheme to urge more colleges to explore how the DofE can complement their curriculum by supporting learners in the development of essential employability skills whilst recognising wider achievement. In Scotland more than 38,000 young people have taken part in the awards over the past 12 months. Although the DofE is available to any young person up to their 25th birthday only 25% of DofE Scotland's work is with those over the age of 17. Kate Somervail has now been appointed by the DofE to support colleges in Scotland to develop the awards to ensure college students gain from this opportunity.

Employers and universities alike rate those young people who achieve a DofE Award as exemplary employees, students and UK citizens.

'Employers know that DofE turns young people into great employees. What's so clever is that it is as relevant today as it was 50 years ago. The DofE is a great way for young people to differentiate themselves and develop the maturity needed to do well at work' said Karren Brady, Vice-Chair West Ham Football Club, and BBC One's The Apprentice regular.

At a CDN/DofE joint event in May we dispelled the myths around DofE. Some colleges shared how they are already using the Awards and others took the first step in developing them in their colleges.

Minecraft Challenge 2014



Following on from the success of the Minecraft Challenge 2013, this year's challenge began in April. The Challenge is part of the Emporium of Dangerous Ideas 2014 and coincides with preparations for the Glasgow Commonwealth Games 2014.

With over 150 participants and more than 30 teams (from secondary schools and colleges, across seven countries) the Challenge finished at the end of May with judges reviewing team contributions and highlighting areas of exceptional work both in design approach and the build within Minecraft.

Each team, consisting of four to six students, had to:

- plan and design an eco-friendly sporting, recreational and living environment
- create an eco-friendly sporting, recreational and living environment within Minecraft
- provide an explanation of and reasoning for design decisions
- reflect upon, (personal and group) learning and skills development throughout the project
- use online/social media tools to support discussion, collaboration and sharing.

Evidence of effective use of these tools is included in the judging criteria with all participants acknowledged through a Certificate of Participation. Why not try the Minecraft game running during the Emporium and lookout for information on the 2015 Challenge.



Code of Good Governance for Scotland's Colleges



The Code of Good Governance Steering Group, chaired by Hugh Hall (Chair of Forth Valley College) with colleagues from across a range of interests including student and staff groups has developed a draft Code of Good Governance for Scotland's Colleges. The purpose of this Code is to codify the principles of good governance that already exist and promote accountability and continuous improvement in how our colleges are governed. The Code also sets out the essential principles of good governance to meet the requirements of the Post-16 Education (Scotland) Act 2013.

The draft Code sets out the principles of good governance across five main areas:

Section A: Leadership and Strategy

Section B: Quality of the Student Experience

Section C: Accountability

Section D: Effectiveness

Section E: Relationships and Collaboration

The steering group took a very deliberate decision to keep the Code focused on the principles of good governance and in so doing, the aim is to achieve a more concise, accessible and unambiguous document that sets out clearly what is required of colleges.

The consultation on the draft Code ends on Tuesday 03 June 2014 and it is anticipated that a finalised Code will be agreed by the summer.

Online Customer Service Module for Students



A new measure in hospitality training.

Scotland welcomes the development of a new online Customer Service module for students.

College Development Network (CDN), through FE colleges in Scotland hopes to deliver an on-line stand alone module for students only, (not for commercial use) delivered through FLOW – a new measure in hospitality training. The resource which consists initially of two parts, Scotland's tourism assets and customer service excellence, will add value to the existing curriculum by supporting the Tourism Scotland 2020 strategy.

A funding partnership will be created between SDS and CDN.

The very successful original Glasgow Welcomes online module was commissioned for the Glasgow Welcomes project by Scottish Enterprise and was developed by FLOW. This will form the basis of the new online module and will take a student two hours to complete.



The delivery within colleges should be considered as complementary to the local delivery by Tourism partnerships.
